Operation Kid Smile Returns



He has recently been a featured speaker at Scottish Rite and AQCC Conferences in Washington DC and Alexandria.

Germany: Library returns books stolen by Nazis to Freemasons

The Bavarian State Library returned 203 books to the German Freemason Museum that were stolen by the Nazis in the 1930s. The two most valuable books included in the collection are by Italian physicist Galileo Galilei, which alone are worth 200,000 euros.

Under Adolf Hitler, the Nazis persecuted Freemasons, outlawed Masonic lodges, seized many of their possessions and sent practicing Freemasons to concentration camps.

"The books are coming home and will be able to be used and remain alive here," said Roland Martin Hank, curator of the German Masonic Museum in Bayreuth.

The return of the books was made at an official ceremony in Munich. The books are largely concerned with Masonic rituals and history.

We mourn the loss of six of our brethren who have been called to distant shores in the past twelve months to continue their work in the Celestial Lodge.

Bro. **Myron Maxwell**, a retired lieutenant in the Seattle Police Dept. and VWBro. **Darrel Womack**, our lovable photographer who always took another photo "just because he could" passed away last December.

Bro. **Leon Joyner** served as an Army telecommunications operator in Hawaii during World War II. He went on to have a 50+ year career with the Pacific Northwest Bell phone company.

Bro. **Albert Campbell**, after a long career as an Urban Planner for the City of Seattle, passed away at the age of 98.

Scattering of Cremated Remains

With nearly 80% of Washington residents choosing cremation as their final disposition, one of the questions we are frequently asked "where can we scatter cremated remains?"

We are very fortunate to have many options here in our evergreen state; cremated remains can be:

- scattered on your own property
- scattered on someone else's property with their permission
- scattered in state or national parks with the permission of the head ranger
- scattered in any navigable waterway (wherever boats can go)
- scatter in a river or the sound from a boat
- or walking to the water's edge
- scatter from a Washington State Ferry when arranged with the ferry system in advance using a water soluble urn. The ferry stops halfway through the run, the family is escorted to the stern of the ferry and is allowed a few moments to toss the urn and flowers off the back. The captain then toots the horn in honor of the deceased. No extra costs except ferry tolls.

Most funeral homes have choices on the type of urn you can use.

And remember always keep the wind at your back!

NO NEED FOR GURUS IN FREEMASONRY

We know the dilemma: we should study for an exam, work on our taxes, weed the peas, call Dad, foresee an erratic employer's last minute demands, all at the same time, of course, and better by yesterday. I would rather go to the dentist than write this paper, clear the desk, pay bills.

Procrastination gives me breathing room. It enhances my well-being, productivity, creativity, my profit.

To further increase these advantages, I must achieve perfection by delaying more things so that I have more of the possibility of improving them. I know procrastination to be of enormous economic benefit to the nation as the basis of much overtime, especially for modern jobs we cannot do without, such as dog walkers, personal shoppers, calorie counters, sidewalk superintendents, message senders. Procrastination is a good source of explanations for everything I do not want to do just now or tomorrow or ever.

We can book seminars with distinguished practitioners and theoreticians of the art of procrastination.

The gurus are an excellent opportunity to plump up our stories with more stories, to hear new twists as justifications, to meet other people and to simply broaden our horizons. We can learn from gurus' offerings for more money. "Inner Engineering" is the latest version of a brain flash with expensive workshops by an Indian swami lecturing America. "Academy of Management" ("AOM"), of Briarcliff Manor, NY, offers only to its best clients similar courses "to deal with increased stress levels." The Kansas Leadership Center, at Wichita, teaches its students how to create social change with "leadership is an activity, not a position." Such mantra is said to create an atmosphere of "radical inclusion ... at every level of society ..." Who knew?

On the other hand, instead of paying thousands of dollars for enriching our lives with time management workbooks and scheduling calendars sold only to the select few, or instead of spending time in cheap middle management personality development workshops with bran flakes, instead of a few impenetrable Eastern sayings, instead of yoga butt-lifting talk improving one's personality, instead of leadership lectures, instead of bla-bla seminars on "techno-stress," with bla-bla-bla costing at least twice as much, we have the ability to go to Lodge and do all these things and more by ourselves.

Freemasons in particular do not need that AOM or other management. We have all the means needed to do our job, namely our minds. We have to use the mind. We have the place to do it right here in the Temple. We do not let ourselves get distracted. At least once a month, we are encouraged to turn off smartphone, Facebook and Google. Be unreachable, *incomunicado totalmente*, for an hour or so to the boss, underbosses, bossy secretaries, intrusive internet friends. To think better, let's engage in full internet non-connect also in the bathroom.

Admittedly, for some people, this last item may be quite tricky.

In the Temple, I put myself in the right position with other men of a – hopefully – similar mind and disposition. It is a ceremony of light. Man can make light, douse it or keep it going and grow it to penetrate darkness. In Lodge, I go to the light, I am in light. I look at my life and my decisions; I compare my assessment of where I want to be in the world to where I really am between nowhere and hereabouts. I pose pertinent questions to myself and answer them without anybody else knowing. I do not have to tell anybody. Am I satisfied with myself? Where did I go wrong and why? I reflect upon the state of my rough ashlar after all the time in the quarry. How far to the Temple of Humanity? Will I ever get there? Certainly not by procrastinating.

Lodge is a good time to declare war on fooling oneself. Find out and decide what is truly important to you. You might be surprised how wrong you have been with the best intentions. In Lodge, it is safe to have a moment of enlightenment when we become aware of what we have done and under what pretenses. We can learn from our experiences and work out how to make amends to those we have wronged. Quietly and succinctly we can state our priorities and expectations to our own selves. We can refine our goals until we are satisfied with what we have done and how we have done it. We design our attitude to do the right thing. This is our kind of "inner engineering." It works because we measure ourselves by the 24-inch gauge, facts, experience, square and compasses, i.e. objectively. Of course, there are those who talk their way to purpledom, and then what?

Freemasons can do all these things by themselves and by their measure, i.e., without a guru and borrowed wisdom. Freemasons do not need to make themselves interesting by ridiculing or criticizing others.

Freemasons have the freedom and opportunity to make themselves better men, and some do.
