

2024 Annual Membership Fees Due

Notices for annual dues were mailed to all dues-owing members of St. John's in October. Don't forget that we no longer issue plastic cards. The new electronic dues cards will not work unless you have paid your dues for the current year. You can access your own dues card on Grand View to



print or use electronically on your phone. A quick scan by the Tyler of your printed QR Code will show whether or not you are current for the year.

2024 dues structure for membership in St. John's:

- 1. Past Masters, Life Members, 50-year members = \$0
- 2. Age 65 + = \$75 + \$28 = \$103*
- 3. Residence 50+ miles from Lodge = \$75 + \$28 = \$103*
 - 4. Other Raised Master Masons = \$200+\$28=\$228*
- 5. Future Plural Members (local residence) *prorated quarterly at joining*:
 - a. Jan. March 2024 = \$228
 - b. Apr. June = \$171
 - c. July Sept. = \$114
 - d. Oct. Dec. = \$57

*These fees increase by \$5 each month for overdue payment beginning January 2024.

Members may pay their dues by cash, check, Certificates of Masonic Labor, or a combination of these. Certificates of Labor (now valued at \$30 each) are issued at each stated or special communication (degree or officer installation).

Payment by PayPal is available, <u>though not</u> <u>encouraged</u>. St. John's does not have a PayPal account. If you can pay no other way, you can do so through our Treasurer's personal account (his email is <u>irmaher@comcast.net</u>).

The following St. John's bylaw addresses our current dues structure as adopted at our June 2023 stated communication.

ARTICLE III - Fees and Dues

Section 3. The annual dues for each member shall be Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00 USD) except (6/21/23)

- a) that all members who shall have paid dues to the Fraternity, as verified by the records of the Grand Lodge of Washington, for a period of fifty (50) years shall be relieved from the payment of dues and assessments for life. (6/18/14)
- b) That all Past Masters of the Lodge (except Affiliated Past Masters) shall be relieved from the payment of dues and assessments for life.
- c) That all future assessment increases levied by Grand Lodge will automatically raise our dues by an equivalent amount. (9/29/90)
- d) That those who have attained the age of 65 by January 1 shall pay dues of Seventy-Five Dollars (\$75) per year plus any and all assessments levied by Grand Lodge as stated in paragraph (c) of this Section. (6/18/14)
- e) That those who reside over fifty miles from the site of our regular stated communication shall pay dues of Seventy-Five Dollars (\$75) per year plus any and all assessments levied by Grand Lodge as stated in paragraph (c) of this Section. (6/18/14)
- f) Members may pay for annual dues using St. John's Certificates of Masonic Labor. Each St John's Certificate of Masonic Labor will have a value that is set annually by the Lodge when applied to the annual dues for payment. Members may use multiple St. John's Certificates of Masonic Labor to pay for annual dues up to the total amount of the annual dues. St. John's Certificates of Masonic Labor must be used in the year that they are valid and may not be carried over for any following year's annual dues payments. (10/16/19)

Section 4. The annual dues of members of the Lodge shall be payable in advance of the first day of January of each year for the calendar year.

- a) Any member who has not paid his dues by the first day of January shall be assessed an additional \$5 for each month beyond that date. (6/18/14)
- b) Any member who has not paid his dues for the current year before December 31 thereof shall cease to be a member of this Lodge and his name must be dropped from the roll, unless on or before that date the Lodge remits his dues or grants him an extension for a definite period in which to pay his dues.

Of course, we need to learn the words, we cannot deliver ritual without having done so. However just learning the words leaves the candidate rather short. Just as important as the words are the feeling and emotion that help to communicate the meaning of those words. It is the ability to bring these in that marks the difference between a good ritualist and a really great one. Who seems to be able to conjure up an electric atmosphere in the Lodge room, that holds the candidate and others listening, spellbound until the end.



Lodge Opening Ceremonies

Lodge opening ceremonies are the most frequently practiced of all our rituals. One might think that since they are used at every meeting, this frequent repetition would make them one of the more stable and uniform parts of Masonic ritual. And in many ways they are. All Masonic Lodge opening rituals contain certain key elements, namely the addressing of security matters, the rehearsal of officers' duties, and the formal opening itself. But within this broad framework there exists an enormous range of variation from place to place in the order, method, and wording of the various elements which compose this general outline. The variations exhibited in contemporary opening rituals speak to the traditional diversity of Masonic ritual practices from the fraternity's earliest days.



Veterans Day 2023: November 11

Veterans Day originated as "Armistice Day" on Nov. 11, 1919, the first anniversary of the end of World War I. Congress passed a resolution in 1926 making it an annual observance, and it became a national holiday in 1938. Sixteen years later, then-President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed legislation changing the name to Veterans Day to honor all those who served their country during war or peacetime. On this day, the nation honors military veterans — living and dead — with parades and other observances across the country and a ceremony at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier at Arlington National Cemetery in Virginia.

Veterans Day – November 11, 2023 – will be on Saturday. Banks and Post Offices and other federal and state agencies, however, will be closed Friday, as well as Saturday.




