Freemason's Chess

Freemason's Chess or Masonic Lodge Chess is a chess variant inspired by the symbols and themes of Freemasonry, a fraternal organization that traces its origins to the local fraternities of stonemasons during the 14th century. RISING

The entered apprentice degree shares with us the hope and the dream of rising to live a strong and balanced life. It challenges us to set our intention to climb Jacob's ladder. The degree provides us with the working tools and ideas to do so. Each of the symbols revealed to us contains a potential, a power. It is up to us with the support of our brothers to shape that potential into a rung on our ladder. So doing we shall rise.

The ladder is made up of steps. In Jacob's dream they are already there but that can be misleading. Our personal ladder doesn't have any rungs. We have to create and shape them first. You can begin by putting your foot upon whichever step you need the most.

The founders of Freemasonry took the "theological ladder" of medieval and renaissance thinkers and combined it with the powerful image of Jacob's ladder. So as an entered apprentice you are given - as food for thought and tools to work with - the four cardinal virtues of Plato and Aristotle: temperance, justice, prudence, and fortitude, and the three virtues of the New Testament: faith, hope and charity

So, our task is to develop fortitude, to master the art of prudence, to work at opening our hearts to give and receive love thus tempering our drives and emotions, and to practice justice. Such a life will embody love, faith, and hope. Your brothers are there to guide and support you, but only you can fashion each rung and then rise upon the ladder.

It is not for nothing that the act of making a new Master Mason is called Raising. It raises us not to some perfection but to a new starting point. In front of us stands a ladder. Will you choose to rise and climb that ladder?

IT'S TIME TO RENEW YOUR MEMBERSHIP!

ABOUT CATHOLICISM, FREEMASONRY, THE POPE AND HOW THINGS REALLY ARE

Under the headline "<u>Vatican Confirms Ban on</u> <u>Catholics Becoming Freemasons</u>," an undated article in MASONICFIND.com devotes five (5) short paragraphs to its topic of there being a ban. It is followed by many pages of trivia and one-sentence statements which have nothing to do with it. No authorship is claimed. Several Masonic Lodges and publications may have re-printed this article. Here is one reply.

At issue is the Vatican document "Note for the Audience With the Holy Father 13 November 2023." It is marked "Ex Audientia" of even date and is counter-signed by Franciscus, i.e., the Pope. The "Nota" is the minutes of a meeting with the Holy Father and an official of the "Dicastery for the Faith," a Vatican department. On Nov. 15, translations of this "Nota", also in English, were available on the website vaticanews.va. Readers can see there what the Note looks like and reads.

Specifically, the Dicastery states: "To address this issue appropriately, it was decided that the Dicastery would respond by involving the Catholic Bishops' Conference of the Philippines itself, notifying the Conference that it would be necessary to put in place a coordinated strategy among the individual Bishops that envisions two approaches: (a) on the doctrinal level, ...the "Declaration on Masonic Associations" [1983] ..." is mentioned. Subsequently Church Law has been changed radically. Since Nov. 27, 1983, i.e. For 40 years now, Catholics may become Freemasons without religious sanction.

Among other things, MASONICFIND.com stated that "the Dicastery ... issued its opinion, ..."

No. this was not the case. <u>No opinion or order issued</u>. The <u>Pope did not ban anybody or anything anywhere</u>

Voluminous verbiage does not cover up MASONICFIND's glaring lack of evidence. There is no substantive, legal or other value to be found in its article.

Brothers interested in the topic should read the comprehensive and fact-filled "<u>Loge und Altar</u>" (Lodge and Altar) by Michael H. Weninger and fill gaps in their knowledge.

In St. John's, dues increase by \$5 each month for overdue payment beginning January 2024.

Members may pay their dues by cash, check, Certificates of Masonic Labor, or a combination of these. Certificates of Labor (now valued at \$30 each) are issued at each stated or special communication (degree or officer installation).

Payment by PayPal is available. St. John's does not have a PayPal account. If you can pay no other way, you can do so through our Treasurer's personal account (his email is jrmaher@comcast.net).

St. John's Approves Funding for Washington Educator of the Year as a Noble Project

Helsinki – the

capital of Finland

Kuopio – my hometown some 250 miles north-east of Helsinki (middle of Lake District)

Turku – south-western Finland, ferries to Sweden The dates are as they are based on the centenary program of Finnish Grand Lodge

- -Wednesday/Thursday September 4/5; flight Seattle-Helsinki (price typically \$700-900, today even a direct flight operated by Finnair, price was today 730€, about the same in dollars, $1 \in \{1,1\}$
- -Friday September 6; Studia Masonica Centenary Lecture (history of Finnish Freemasonry), Sibelius ritual music presentation
- -Saturday September 7; centenary festivities (gala dinner if wanted, otherwise drive to Savonlinna by Russian border), local Lodge officers, ancient castle, lake district
- -Sunday September 8; drive to Kuopio, local summer cabin, sauna
